A Message from our Pastor

I'm going to guess that when most folks hear the word "stewardship" in the context of church, most people think it's only about money. I want to have a different conversation about stewardship. To begin, here's the Merriam-Webster's On-Line Dictionary definition of the word: "1. The office, duties, and obligations of a steward; 2. The conduction, supervising, or managing of something, especially: the careful and responsible management of something entrusted to one's care." Nothing there says anything about money.

For people of God, stewardship has way more to do with our relationship with God than it does with our wallets or bank accounts. It's a Discipleship Issue, first and foremost. When we join the United Methodist Church, one of the questions that gets asked is: "Do you confess Jesus Christ as your Savior, put your whole trust in his grace, and promise to serve him as your Lord, in union with the church, which Christ has opened to people of all ages, nations, and races?" I want to focus for a moment on the phrase: "... put your whole trust in his grace...." Do we trust Jesus with our whole lives? Do we trust Jesus to be faithful in our lives? Do we trust that God's infinite love and presence is ours? Have we studied and learned how faithful God has been in the past, so that we can anticipate God's faithfulness in the future? When we answer these questions, we have the basics of discipleship. It also means, we have the starting point for stewardship. Additionally, if we are saying "yes" to these questions, I have a follow-up question: "What's your response to God's faithfulness?" In my life, I said "yes" to confirmation and I said "yes" to a call into ministry. The "yes" to a call into ministry came with a profound new understanding of the Church, scripture, the United Methodist denomination, and a rather large amount of debt. I knew God was faithful, so I trusted that the debt would be cleared. (It has been.) A more conventional way of responding to God's grace is to

tithe. In the classic sense, a tithe is 10% of income. This may be a new idea for some and an even scarier idea for others. Let's go back to the question: "Do you put your whole trust in his grace?" Can we trust that God will be faithful when we offer a faithful response? I think we can.

The Leadership Board knows that promoting stewardship in the life of the congregation has gotten lost in the shuffle of things. In the next days and weeks (perhaps months), there will be more conversations about Stewardship and what a faithful response to God may be. That faithful response will be as individual as each of us. For some, it will be putting a little more in an offering envelope. For someone else, it might be spending time on the church property, waiting for a delivery or picking up sticks. There is much for us to do. We have been gifted with a beautiful church property, full of history and full of faith. We are to be good stewards of it, so that others in the future will know of the faithfulness of God in our midst. I pray that it will always be so.

Sunday School

We have been learning about the words of Jesus. For our next unit, outlined below, **we will need the help of some of you or friends of yours**: specifically, a police officer, a healthcare worker, a teacher, a grocery store worker, and a social worker. We will provide interested friends with supporting curriculum and we only ask that they be honest and open to the questions of our students. Folks from other occupations and retirees would also be welcomed to visit our class.

"Everyday Heroes: Honoring God's Workforce" is a 5-week children's ministry curriculum that aims to solve this problem by teaching children the value and dignity of work from a biblical perspective. Each week, children will learn about a different profession, understanding that all work, when done with the intention to glorify God and serve others, is a divine calling. Children will have an opportunity to think about their own interests and how God is preparing them to be a hero in their own vocational calling one day. They will explore the roles of:

- 1. Police Officers Upholders of justice, safety, and order, echoing God's love for righteousness (Romans 13:1).
- 2. Healthcare Workers Healers and comforters, embodying Christ's compassionate healing ministry (1 Corinthians 12:9).
- 3. Teachers Guiders of growth and wisdom, reflecting Solomon's wisdom and Jesus as our ultimate teacher (Proverbs 22:6).
- 4. Grocery Workers Providers of essential sustenance, akin to God's provision for His people (Colossians 3:23).
- 5. Social Workers Advocates for vulnerable individuals and families, demonstrating God's care for the downtrodden and marginalized (Proverbs 31:8-9).

By the end of the series, children will not only have a greater appreciation for these everyday heroes but also a deeper understanding of how their possible future vocations can serve God and their community. They will learn to value work, not just as a means to an end, but as a way to participate in God's ongoing work in the world. We are excited about this unit and hope it will speak to our students.

Stewardship - Why should it matter to me?

Defining Stewardship

- An ethical value that embodies the responsible planning and management of resources.
- Notice that the main focus is NOT around money \$\$\$ but resources.
- The resources are from our oath when we joined the United Methodist Church. (Giving of our time, talents, gifts, and service)

How can I possibly work towards tithing my 10%?

Let's look at an example:

Zeke, with a family of four, regularly attends Sunday services. The family's income is \$60,000. Following expenses, Zeke is only able to put 4% towards tithing.

If the expression **time = money** is relative and Zeke values his time at \$20/hr., we can conclude the following:

If Zeke utilizes his time, talents, and service to his church he can more closely achieve his tithing goal.

Reaching 10% tithing would relate to Zeke spending 180 hours doing related work for the church at \$20/hr. over the course of a year.

If a full-time job consumes about 2000 hrs/yr; 180 hrs./year would be 9%. This would result in Zeke spending roughly 3.5 hrs./wk. doing church related work.

You're probably thinking, 'This is not feasible!'

And you would be 100% correct.

But did you get the point of this example?



If one utilizes this logic, any church-related work Zeke does on site or at home, closes the tithing gap.

A church organization has numerous activities that go on behind the scenes. Each participating member and guest have their own opportunity to work towards fulfilling their oath. All one has to do is faithfully give of their time, talents, gifts, and service. Within a church there truly is something for everyone to engage in, in order to do their part in glorifying our Lord and Savior.

> Accept the challenge, fulfill your oath and be a difference in your world. Stewardship is for everyone!


A wake-up call

2-part Laity Academy to begin April 27



'Creation, Evolution and Intelligent Design'

Eastern PA laity will get another double portion of the conference's annual Laity Academy in 2024—a biannual pairing that has succeeded in drawing participants since late 2021, when online and onsite courses were offered as the Covid-19 pandemic began to wane.

This 40th year of EPA's Laity Academy—with two onsite sessions in April and August—will draw inspiration from Hebrews 10:24-25, …"And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another—and all the more as you see the Day approaching."

The first 2024 session will be a one day, in-person course on April 27, titled, "Creation, Evolution and Intelligent Design." Cornwells United Methodist Church in Bensalem will host it in its chapel from 8 a.m. to noon and 1 to 5 p.m. "It is open to anyone who wishes to understand more about these timely topics from a Methodist perspective," said new Laity Academy Dean, Brenda Binns. Registration is limited and will be available in mid-March.

"The subject of origins remains an ongoing source of high interest, discussion and inquiry," reads the course description. "The topic has far-reaching implications and has led to many questions about the science of evolution, the Genesis Creation stories, and the genetic lineage of Homo sapiens. "

The course instructor, Steve Myers, is a retired teacher who has taught biology and related courses for 40 years. He has led classes and discussions on these topics for groups ranging from high school teachers to church members. At Cornwells UMC, Myers is a Lay Leader, adult Sunday School teacher, prayer coordinator, and liturgist, who is also involved in

music and missions.

"The class will explore a fundamental question: 'What do we know today that Charles Darwin, in the mid 1800's, did not yet understand?'," reads the description. "While a number of scientific laws and theories will be addressed, there is no need for an advanced degree to understand the many concepts that Myers presents in questioning if the increase in scientific knowledge has strengthened or weakened the data base underlying evolutionary theory.

"The biblical record of origins will then be examined. Although references to God's role as the Author of Creation are found in both the Old and New Testaments, there will be a specific emphasis in the second portion of the class on Jesus' perspective about Creation.

"This class was first offered at the August 2023 Laity Academy and proved to be one of the most well-regarded, with Steve Myers receiving high marks for his presentation, his thoughtprovoking questions, and the resources and reference materials he shared that enabled class participants to consider and discuss highly sensitive yet timely topics."

The course cost is a \$30 fee, which covers instructional materials, a light breakfast and lunch, and other expenses.

The second part of the 2024 Laity Academy will happen August 2-3 at Eastern University's Palmer Theological Seminar in St. David's. Courses will be announced and open for registration by May 21, in time for Annual Conference.

What is the Laity Academy?

The EPAUMC Laity Academy was begun as—and still is—a way to train church members to take part in the many ministries of the United Methodist Church. The academy in August of 2024 will be the 40th session held by our conference. The weekend events are planned <u>by</u> the laity and are <u>for</u> the laity.

Originally targeting speaking ministries, Laity Academy classes provided the instruction that enabled lay members to lead worship and preach sermons. Early on, the members of the Eastern Pennsylvania Conference realized that not all laity who were being called into ministry were called to preach; there were many other ministries that could benefit from lay involvement.

While speaking classes are offered at every session of the full academy, there are also classes in leading and caring ministries, as well as a basic class on United Methodist ministry. The academy classes are one way that Christ Servant Ministers and Certified Lay Ministers can fulfill their requirements for continuing education in ministry, but any member of the laity may take any academy class that has no prerequisites – such as the April 2024 class -or any classes for which they have met the prerequisites.

The Academy is a next step up from Tools for Ministry for lay members seeking more advanced training in **caring, leading and speaking** ministries. The Laity Academy's 10 -hour classes provide the first steps in the journey for Christ Servant Ministers and continuing education for CSM's, Lay Speakers and Certified lay Ministers.

EARTH DAY 2024

PLANET VS. PLASTICS is the Earth Day 2024 theme. The theme calls us to:

- Learn about the health risk of plastics,
- Promote actions and policies which protect our planet and preserve its natural resources,
- Advocate for the rapid phase out of all single use plastics, and
- Demand an end to fast fashion.

Celebrated on April 22nd, Earth Day has been in existence since 1970. While it is not a federal holiday, many celebrate the day through environmental education, awareness and action.

Do You Know?

- In the U.S., more than 100 billion plastic beverage containers were sold last year.
- More than 500 billion plastic bags were produced worldwide last year.
- Making a plastic bottle requires six times as much water as the bottle holds.

What Can You Do to Help the Planet And Celebrate Earth Day 2024?

- Reduce, reuse and recycle. Conserve our natural resources and landfill space by cutting down on what you throw away.
- Reduce your use of single use plastics: get a set of silverware to keep in the car to use while eating out and traveling; switch to reusable bags, water bottles, straws and coffee cups.
- Conserve water.
- Pick up trash, especially plastic bottles and bags, when you take a walk.
- Buy local food. Eat less meat.
- Be a smart shopper. Skip plastic; buy glass or paper products.
- Use environmentally friendly cleaning products.
- Turn lights off when not in use. Use energy efficient light bulbs.
- Plant a tree. Trees are powerful tools for combating the climate crisis.
- Stop pesticide and chemical use on your lawn and in your gardens.
- **Participate in advocacy.** Learn about the science behind climate change and show responsibility in addressing it by taking climate action to the next level. Send a letter to your local elected officials, or speak up at your next town hall meeting.
- Walk or bike More. Drive less.
- Get the whole family involved. Organize a nature-themed scavenger hunt. Take a walk in one of the parks in our community. Host a yard/garage sale and encourage secondhand shopping to prevent goods from going to the landfill. Plant a pollinator garden using species native to your area to support local populations of butterflies, bees, and other organisms critical to sustained biodiversity in your ecosystem.
- Educate yourself and your kids. Head to the library. Read classics like, "The Lorax" by Dr. Seuss, "Silent Spring" by Rachel Carson, or newer titles about sustainability, climate change, and the environment, like "All We Can Save" or "Braiding Sweetgrass".

In partnership with volunteers, donors, in-house partners and community partners, Mission Central's warehouse assisted **6.3 million people** with over **\$17.4 million in resources**. Mission Central programs accounted for over **\$3.5 million in resources** to reach **643,000 people**!


The Infrastructure:


