"... Come now, let us argue it out, says the Lord...."
(Isaiah 1:18 NRSVUE)

February is Black History Month

Black History Month is an annual celebration of achievements by African Americans and a time to recognize their role in U.S. history. It is a time to honor the contributions and legacy of African Americans - from activists and civil rights pioneers, such as Harriet Tubman, Sojourner Truth, Martin Luther King Jr., and Rosa Parks, to leaders in industry, politics, science, culture and more. It was initially seen as a way of teaching students and young people about the contributions of Black Americans; today it is seen as a celebration of those who have impacted our country through their leadership and achievements. So, in celebration of Black

History month, the paragraphs below highlight pioneering and groundbreaking Black Americans in U.S. Methodist history.

Harry Hosier, 1750 - 1806 Methodist Preacher Circuit Rider

Harry Hosier was America's first Black Methodist preacher. "I really believe he is one of the best preachers in the world," was the opinion of Thomas Coke, who, along with Francis Asbury, was one of American Methodism's first two bishops. "There is such an amazing power that attends his preaching, though he cannot read; and he is one of the humblest creatures I ever saw."

Despite such accolades, very little is known about Hosier's life. He was born about 1750, perhaps as a plantation slave in North Carolina. He experienced Christian conversion at some point and when he was about 30 years old, he met Francis Asbury and became his traveling companion as a circuit riding preacher. Soon he began to exhort after the sermon, urging the listeners to apply the preacher's words to their lives. Later, he was the principal speaker at services.

He and Richard Allen were the two non-voting African American representatives at the 1784 Christmas Conference, which officially organized American Methodism. His famous sermon, "The Barren Fig Tree," preached at Adam's Chapel in Fairfax County, Virginia, in May of 1781, was the first recorded Methodist sermon by a Black person in America. Likewise, his sermon in Chapeltown, Delaware, 1784, was the first sermon preached by a Black minister to a white congregation.

Hosier drew large, multiracial crowds who would come from near and far to hear him. The Methodist Church grew by leaps and bounds from the ministry offered by Harry Hosier.

Francis Burns, 1809 – 1863 Missionary Bishop

The Rev. Francis Burns was an American Methodist minister who served as a missionary in Liberia. He was the first Missionary Bishop, and the first African American Bishop of the Methodist Episcopal Church (elected in 1858).

His early life was spent in Greene County, NY. His family was poor, and at the age of four he was indentured to a farmer. At age eight, he was indentured to the Atwood family. Mrs. Atwood, a Methodist class leader, permitted Francis to attend school with her children during the winter season.

Francis joined the Methodist Episcopal Church at age fifteen and at seventeen showed interest in preaching. When his indenture expired at age twenty-one, Francis worked as a teacher and became licensed to preach in the Catskill Hudson District. Others took notice of his preaching skills and encouraged him to study to become a missionary. His opportunity to do this came in 1834, when he accompanied the Rev. John Seys to Liberia.

After ten years as a missionary teacher and leader in Liberia, he traveled to New York to be ordained by Bishop Edmund Janes. Returning to Liberia, Rev. Burns taught in Monrovia Seminary and in 1845 succeeded Rev. Seys as editor of Africa's Luminary, the quarterly publication of the Missionary Society in Liberia. Rev. Burns also served for many of these years as president of the Liberia Conference.

In 1856, the General Conference approved the election of a missionary bishop in Africa. The Liberia Conference elected Rev. Burns as their first bishop in 1858. The importance of this action for Methodism, especially Methodism in Liberia, cannot be overestimated.

The legacy of Liberian-based Methodist ministries started, organized, and led by Bishop Burns continues to flower in many forms today. United Methodists in Liberia number just over 300,000. Though not the largest Christian denomination in Liberia, United Methodists have had a significant influence in public life, including as two the nation's last three presidents (Ellen Johnson Sirleaf, 2006-2018, and George Weah, 2018-2024).

Rev. Sallie Alford Crenshaw, 1900-1986 Missionary Pastor

Sallie A Crenshaw was ahead of her time, serving as a missionary and pastor when ministry was limited for women, especially Black women. Born around 1900 in LaGrange, Ga., of Irish, Cherokee and African American descent, Sallie Alford Crenshaw was reared in Chattanooga. A graduate of the Chattanooga public schools, she attended Tennessee State Normal School, Gammon Theological Seminary, Clark College and the University of Nebraska and was the first Black student to attend Tennessee Wesleyan College. Since ordination was closed to women, she became a missionary under the auspices of the Methodist Board of Missions.

In 1935, the Board of Missions sent her to minister to the black coal miners around Bluefield, W.Va. She lived with desperately poor mining families, often sleeping on the floor, teaching them, especially the children, what she could. At the same time, she was pastoring churches in the East Tennessee Methodist Conference. Over her career, she served as supply pastor to 12 churches, including several in Chattanooga. She was later appointed as the first African American to travel the country, preaching to both black and white congregations and promoting church desegregation. In 1958, two years after The Methodist Church approved full clergy rights for women, Crenshaw became the Rev. Crenshaw. She was the first woman ordained by the East Tennessee Methodist Conference.
