From the Pastor's Desk ~

"For everything there is a season and a time for every matter under heaven...." (Ecclesiastes 3:1 NR\$VUE) I'm not really sure why these words appeared in my head as I sat down to write. I had thought that I would write something about Lent. It may happen before I get to the end, but I'm not sure yet.

What I am sure of is that seasons are changing. The days are staying light a little bit longer. The trees are starting take on a reddish-brown hue. This is always an indication that buds have formed and are just waiting for things to warm up enough to pop out. I heard a robin while walking the trash to the dumpster. Spring is around the corner.

I love the change of seasons. Each season brings with it its own sets of experiences. Summer is warm and full of color. It's a time for spending time in the mountains or at the beach. Maybe just spending time with our feet in a backyard kiddie pool. Fall is the season for different colors; cooler air, and joy for the relief from the heat. Winter is cold with dull colors. They are the colors of dormancy and waiting. It's a time for huddling under blankets with a hot cup of something and watching a movie or reading a book. It's a reminder that we can slow down and rest awhile. And then there's Spring. A time for rebirth and new life. Trees pop with leaves and blossoms that fill our visions. They remind us that life renews.

Just as there are seasons of the year, there are seasons of life. (Cue the Broadway musical song...) Sometimes the seasons are physical changes; like a toddler growing into a child. Other times the seasons are about emotional change; like learning to forgive the one who has caused harm in our lives. Seasons can be contemplative or physical. Perhaps all at the same time. Lent is a season (got here) for us to put time aside to work on our relationship with God so that when Holy Week, and ultimately Easter arrives, we are ready to receive ALL that God, through the Holy Spirit and Jesus' life, death, and resurrection, has prepared for us – New Life, New Hope, New Purpose.

I encourage, "... you, therefore, in the name of the Church, to observe a holy Lent: by self–examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self–denial; and by reading and meditating on God's Holy Word." (UMBOW322)

In all his glory


On the Sunday before Ash Wednesday, many Christian churches celebrate the Transfiguration of Our Lord. After telling his shocked, uncomprehending disciples that he would die and rise again,

Jesus took Peter, James and John up a mountain. Suddenly Jesus appeared to be glowing! "He was transfigured before them, and his face shone like the sun, and his clothes became white as light" (Matthew 17:2, ESV).



Moses and Elijah appeared, and a voice said, "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased; listen to him" (verse 5). Jesus' disciples fell to the ground, overcome by fear. But Jesus touched them, told them not to be afraid and led them down the mountain.

The disciples witnessed firsthand the glory and Godhood of Jesus, who would soon die for the sins of the world and rise again to give us life.



CROSS OF ASHES — On Ash Wednesday, as Lent begins, worshipers' foreheads are often marked with ashes in the sign of the cross. The ashes traditionally come from burning palm branches from the previous Palm Sunday. In the Old Testament, ashes were a sign of mourning and repentance. Today, some worshipers wipe off the ashes before leaving church, to symbolize being cleansed from sin by Jesus' death; others wear the ashes the rest of the day, carrying the cross of Christ into the world. Reciting Genesis 3:19 often accompanies the placement of ashes: "You are dust, and to dust you shall return."




While women have certainly come quite a long way in America, they still face far more obstacles than men in nearly all aspects of life: education, work, healthcare, legal rights, violence and much more. Women earn less than men on average, and are underrepresented in leadership careers and politics. They suffer gender-based violence, human trafficking, inadequate healthcare, higher rates of poverty, lack of education, more food insecurity than men, discriminatory social institutions – the list goes on. Women Educating & Inspiring Generations

The theme for Women's History Month 2025 is, "Moving Forward Together! Women Educating & Inspiring Generations." This theme celebrates the collective strength, equality, and influence of women who have dedicated their lives to education, mentorship, and leadership, shaping the minds and futures of all generations.

Importance and Relevance

Education has always been a powerful catalyst for change, and women have been at the forefront, driving this transformation. From classrooms to boardrooms, and from grassroots movements to global initiatives, women educators and leaders have played a pivotal role in nurturing minds and inspiring action.



Dorothy Height (1912-2010)

Dorothy Height was a civil and women's rights activist, serving as the National Council of Negro Women President for 40 years. In the 1950s and 60s, she fought gender bias and was a key figure in the struggles for voting rights, desegregation and employment opportunities. She did much of her work outside the spotlight. Height was on the platform with Martin Luther King Jr. as he gave his "I Have a Dream" speech and with Barack Obama when he was sworn in as the first African-American president in 2009. In 1989, President Reagan awarded her the Presidential Citizenship Medal. She received the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 1994 from President Clinton and was awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor by President George W. Bush in 2004, accepting it "on behalf of millions of people – particularly women – whose work goes unnoticed." After her death, the U.S. Post office near Union Station in Washington, D.C., was named in her honor, the first federal building in the district named for an African-American woman.

President Obama, when he delivered the eulogy at her memorial service, said that she "deserves a place of honor in America's memory."

Mary McLeod Bethune (1875-1955)

Mary McLeod Bethune, the daughter of former slaves, is known as a dedicated champion of African-American education, an influential member of President Franklin Roosevelt's "Black Cabinet", and an important civil and women's right leader. In 1940, she became vice president of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), an American civil rights organization formed in 1909. She held this position for the rest of her life.

As a youngster, she taught her siblings and former-slave parents how to read. Mary knew that education was one of the few ways Black citizens, especially Black women, could break the cycle of poverty. There were very few schools for Black girls. So, on October 3, 1904, she opened the Daytona Literary and Industrial Training School for Negro Girls with \$1.50, faith in God, and five little girls. Within two years, the school, which focused on practical, employable skills, including domestic science, sewing, agriculture, and teaching, had 250 students! In 1911, she realized that none of the local hospitals served Black patients. In response, she added a nursing program so that the school could open its own hospital. Today, graduates of the school, now known as Bethune-Cookman University, become leaders in business, education, health sciences, the arts, and more.

Mary also championed the rights of African-American voters. When women won the right to vote in 1920, she organized African American men and women in Florida to go to the polls. She made it a priority for her students to vote. She raised money to pay poll taxes and offered special classes for the literacy tests, mandated by Jim Crow laws that tried to silence black voices.

Bethune's own voice was definitely heard. She led the way in desegregating the American Red Cross and Women's Army Auxiliary Corps. She was a bipartisan adviser to three U.S. presidents, serving the Coolidge, Hoover and Roosevelt administrations.

Trudie Kibbe Reed, the first woman president of Bethune-Cookman following Bethune herself, said of the university's namesake, "She had a vision of giving education and empowerment to any of God's people who needed help." "She encouraged civic engagement, and that included voting."

Pastoral Letter Addressing the Plight of Migrants, Immigrants and Refugees in the US Epiphany 2025

Jesus said, "When you welcome the stranger, you welcome me...." Matthew 25:35

At no time has the church in the US had a greater opportunity to welcome Jesus among us as he journeys with migrants, immigrants, and refugees than today. We your bishops are clear that the situation these beloved of God face as the Trump Administration comes to power threatens their humanity, livelihood, and basic human rights.

For decades, a broken immigration system in the U.S. has kept migrants, immigrants and refugees in this country living in the shadows of society in a state of perpetual fear. They have come to the U.S. under forced circumstances fleeing extreme poverty, hunger, political and religious persecution, war, cartel and gang violence, and the severe impact of climate change. Some are actively recruited by large U.S. companies who need their labor. Yet migrants, immigrants and refugees help to sustain the U.S. economy, serve our families caring for our children and our elderly, cleaning our homes, landscaping our properties, building our roads and the houses we live in, and cultivating and picking the crops that feed our families. They are our neighbors, our friends, and members and pastors of our churches.

Deplorably, racist, xenophobic, nationalistic, and anti-migrant hate speech has become standard rhetoric for many US politicians, including President-elect Donald Trump. He has stated that under his administration he will order the mass deportation of the 11 million undocumented migrants who live and work in the U.S. He has threatened to use military and law enforcement at all levels for this mass deportation. If allowed, this mass deportation of migrants will cause further racial profiling, the separation of families, the undermining of communities and congregations, the weakening of the economy of this country and its democratic systems of law and justice. President-elect Trump has also threatened to end birth-right citizenship, dismantle Refugee resettlement in this country and further strip away the possibility of the U.S. welcoming Asylum Seekers onto this land.

We are living in a dark time that more than ever calls us to be the light of Christ, people of faith who take our baptismal vow to "resist evil in all its forms," with utmost seriousness.

As United Methodists we have firmly declared through our *Social Principles* that we are called to actively welcome the migrant, immigrant, and refugee among us.

- Affirming the dignity, worth and rights of migrants, immigrants and refugees. Recognizing that displaced people are particularly vulnerable as their in-between status often provides them with few protections and benefits, leaving them open to exploitation, violence and abuse.
- Urging one another to welcome migrants, refugees, and immigrants into our congregations, providing concrete support, to them including help with navigating

restrictive and often lengthy immigration policies, and assistance with securing food, housing, education, employment and other kinds of support.

- Opposing all laws and policies that attempt to criminalize, dehumanize or punish displaced individuals and families based on their status as migrants, immigrants or refugees.
- Decrying attempts to detain displaced people and hold them in inhumane and unsanitary conditions.
- Challenging policies that call for the separation of families, especially parents and minor children.
- Opposing the existence of for-profit detention centers that are used for the purpose of detaining migrants, immigrants, and refugees including minor children.

We your bishops call upon the people of The United Methodist Church to pray for migrants, immigrants, and refugees among us and to welcome them with the fullness of Christian love, remembering that as we welcome these, our brothers, and sisters, we welcome Jesus our Lord.
